

Governor's Emergency Council Report

July 1, 2001 – June 30, 2002

In compliance with section §35-192E of the Arizona Revised Statutes, the following report is a summary of obligations and expenditures of state funds under the authority granted by the State Legislature in §35-192E, Arizona Revised Statutes. The report covers the time period from July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002. It represents the actions taken by the State of Arizona, Governor's Emergency Council in response to Arizona's emergency needs.

I. GUBERNATORIAL PROCLAMATIONS OF FY 2002

As a result of emergency situations, which were beyond the capability and resources of local government, four Gubernatorial proclamations were declared.

A. GILA BEND/AJO STORM EMERGENCY (22001)

On August 17, 2001, the Governor proclaimed an emergency for Maricopa and Pima Counties for the major monsoon storm in the communities of Gila Bend, Buckeye and Ajo. The storm had significant lightning, high winds and heavy rain and downed several utility poles and caused fires in two power substations. The proclamation included an allocation of \$200,000 for emergency protective measures, debris removal, road repair and repair of communications equipment.

B. SEPTEMBER TERRORISM INCIDENT (22002)

On September 12, 2001, the Governor proclaimed a state of emergency due to the terrorist attacks in various locations throughout the United States and the heightened level of security throughout Arizona. The proclamation included \$40,000 to cover the emergency protective measures. On October 2, 2001, the Governor amended the proclamation to end the incident period for political subdivisions (September 11 – 17, 2001) and to allocate an additional \$160,000 for a total of \$200,000. Allocations of \$1,459,000 and \$1,186,928, were made on November 19, 2001, and February 19, 2002, respectively, from the Governor's Emergency Council for a total of \$2,845,928 for this emergency. The incident period continues for state agencies.

C. MILITARY AIRPORT SECURITY (22003)

On October 16, 2001, the Governor proclaimed an emergency for the activation of military security personnel at the airports throughout Arizona in conjunction with the terrorism events of September 11, 2001. The Governor's Emergency Fund covered four days leading up to the beginning of the Federal funding of the mission. The proclamation included an allocation of \$100,000 to cover the emergency protective measures.

- D. CITRUS WOOD CHIP FIRE EMERGENCY (22004)**
 On October 30, 2001, the Governor proclaimed an emergency for a fire in Pinal County near Queen Creek. Over twenty acres of land with citrus wood chips broke out in fire. The state was called after it became above and beyond the local governments capability to handle it. The fire was extinguished on November 1, 2001. The proclamation included an allocation of \$200,000 to cover the emergency protective measures.
- E. YAVAPAI COUNTY INDIAN FIRE (22005)**
 On May 16, 2002, the Governor proclaimed an emergency for the Indian Fire in Yavapai County near the City of Prescott in the Prescott National Forrest to cover the recovery costs. FEMA Fire Management Assistance Grant covers the fire suppression costs. The proclamation included an allocation of \$200,000 to cover the emergency protective measures provided by state agencies.
- F. RODEO/CHEDISKI FIRE EMERGENCY (22006)**
 On June 19, 2002, the Governor proclaimed a state of emergency in support of the political subdivisions of Arizona for the consequences of the Rodeo Fire, which started June 18, 2002, near the town of Cibeqe on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation. On June 20, 2002, the Chediski Fire started near the Chediski Mountain on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation. On June 25, 2002, President George W. Bush declared the Rodeo/Chediski Fire a major disaster, providing Public Assistance for Navajo and Apache Counties and the Fort Apache Indian Reservation within those counties. Individual Assistance was made available for Navajo, Apache, Gila and Coconino Counties and the Fort Apache Indian Reservation within those counties. Mitigation assistance was made available statewide. The initial proclamation included an allocation of \$100,000 to cover the initial response for emergency protective measures.

II. GUBERNATORIAL PROCLAMATIONS TERMINATED

- A. GILA COUNTY POTABLE WATER SHORTAGE (21101)**
 On July 28, 2000, the Governor proclaimed an emergency in Gila County for a potable water shortage, effective July 21, 2000 and continuing. Gila County hauled potable water to rural communities throughout the year as the waterlines, pumps and wells were repaired. The proclamation included an allocation of \$50,000 for emergency measures.

Declared: July 28, 2000
 Terminated: January 15, 2002

- B. GILA BEND/AJO STORM EMERGENCY (22001)**
 A major monsoon storm caused extensive damage in the communities of Gila Bend, Buckeye and Ajo. The storm had significant lightning, high

winds and heavy rain and downed several utility poles and caused fires in two power substations. All recovery work was completed.

Declared: August 17, 2001
Terminated: February 19, 2002

C. MILITARY AIRPORT SECURITY (22003)

Military security personnel were activated to provide security at the airports throughout Arizona in conjunction with the terrorism events of September 11, 2001. The State of Arizona funded the four days leading up to the date when the Federal Government assumed responsibility of the mission. All recovery work was completed.

Declared: October 16, 2001
Terminated: April 5, 2002

D. CITRUS WOOD CHIP FIRE EMERGENCY (22004)

A fire broke out on twenty to forty acres of land with citrus wood chips in Pinal County near the Town of Queen Creek. The state was called to assist after it became above and beyond the local governments capability to handle it. All recovery work was completed.

Declared: October 30, 2001
Terminated: June 6, 2002

II. GUBERNATORIAL PROCLAMATIONS EXTENDED

**A. TROPICAL WINTER STORM FLOOD EMERGENCY (93003)
(Presidential Declaration)**

Thirteen Counties involving over 100 political subdivisions, suffered extensive flood damage in January and February 1993. The Governor's letter of January 16, 2002, extended this emergency to July 8, 2002.

B. STATEWIDE DROUGHT EMERGENCY (99006)

Lack of precipitation had significantly reduced surface and ground water supplies and stream flows. The drought continues to endanger crops, property and livestock of the citizens of Arizona. This proclamation was extended to June 23, 2003, as this is still a threatening situation.

C. COCHISE COUNTY FLASH FLOOD EMERGENCY (20002)

Intense monsoon thunderstorms caused extensive flood damage to roadways and retaining walls, and adversely affected the welfare and mobility of the residents and businesses within the Town of Bisbee. This proclamation is extended to August 16, 2002.

- D. SANTA CRUZ COUNTY FLASH FLOOD EMERGENCY (20003)**
Monsoon rains and flash floods caused substantial damage to public infrastructure along the Nogales Wash. This created hazardous conditions as well as a risk to health and safety in Santa Cruz County. This proclamation is extended to August 27, 2002.

B. THE ARIZONA GOVERNOR'S EMERGENCY COUNCIL MEETINGS AND ACTIONS:

- November 19, 2001 Meeting
 - PROPOSAL: To consider supplemental funding for the September Terrorism Incident (22002).
 - COUNCIL ACTION: The Council voted to provide \$1,459,000 for this requirement.
- February 19, 2002 Meeting
 - PROPOSAL: To consider supplemental funding for the Cochise County Flash Flood Emergency (20002).
 - COUNCIL ACTION: The Council voted to provide \$376,459 for this requirement.
 - PROPOSAL: To consider supplemental funding for the Arizona 2000 Flood Emergency (21104).

- COUNCIL ACTION: The Council voted to provide \$127,613 for this requirement.
 - PROPOSAL: To consider supplemental funding for the September Terrorism Incident (22002).
 - COUNCIL ACTION: The Council voted to provide \$1,186,928 for this requirement.
- June 19, 2002 Meeting
 - No Council Actions were requested at the meeting.

V. CONTINGENCIES

A. **STATEWIDE SEARCH AND RESCUE CONTINGENCY (70100)**

There were 536 search and rescue mission identifiers issued to County Sheriffs for field operations during FY2002. County Sheriffs and State support agencies had a total reimbursement cost of \$108,864.07. The Governor's letter of January 16, 2002, allocated a total of \$100,000.00 to pay claims received during FY2002.

B. **HAZARDOUS MATERIALS CONTINGENCY (80100)**

The Division of Emergency Management is the lead agency for developing and implementing a state hazardous materials emergency management program. This includes coordinating adequate planning and preparedness to affect emergency response and recovery operations for hazardous materials incidents or accidents. There were 29 hazardous materials incident responses in part supported by the Governor's HAZMAT Contingency Fund during the period July 1, 2001 to June 30, 2002. During FY2002 \$13,345.22 was provided from the Hazardous Materials Contingency Fund to respond to these hazardous materials incidents. The Governor's letter dated January 16, 2002, allocated \$25,000 to pay claims received during FY2002.
