August 1, 2012 Report

FY2012

July 1, 2011 – June 30, 2012

In compliance with section §35-192E of the Arizona Revised Statutes, the following report is a summary of obligations, allocations and expenditures of state funds under the authority granted by the State Legislature in §35-192E, Arizona Revised Statutes. The report represents the actions taken by the Governor and the Arizona State Emergency Council (Council) in response to Arizona's emergency needs during FY2012 beginning July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012.

I. GUBERNATORIAL PROCLAMATIONS DECLARED

As a result of emergency situations, which were beyond the capability and resources of local government, four gubernatorial proclamations were declared during FY2012.

A. Tombstone Waterline Flooding (73004)

Declared: August 17, 2011

On June 12th through July 26th, 2011, a series of seasonal monsoon rains swept over the areas severely burned by the Monument Fire in the Huachuca Mountains. The City of Tombstone relies on a group of springs in this area for 50-80 percent of its water supply, and the erosion and debris flow from the burn area caused substantial damage to both the aqueduct and transmission system for this critical water supply. The City had to rely on backup water sources that they share with other jurisdictions until the primary infrastructure could be repaired.

The City, in accordance with A.A.C. R8-2-304, requested assistance from the State with the temporary repair of the facility and related engineering. The Governor's declaration appropriated \$50,000 to this emergency for these temporary repairs. The City intends on pursuing funding from the USDA Rural Development program for the permanent repairs, and is not requesting long-term funding from the State.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$50,000 to this emergency for these repairs.

B. Northern Greenlee County Flooding (73005)

Declared: September 9, 2011

On August 24th, 2011, a powerful seasonal monsoon rain swept over the areas severely burned by the Wallow Fire in Northern Greenlee County. Residents in the affected area rely on one primary route of ingress and egress for their daily activities and access for emergency personnel, and this road sustained major damage from the ensuing debris and water flow. Access was substantially limited, and the damage to the shoulder and road continued to worsen with each subsequent storm. The flooding undermined protective measures (gabion baskets and rip rap) that were in

place prior to the storm, and required major construction to repair these to their pre-disaster condition.

The County, in accordance with A.A.C. R8-2-304, requested assistance from the State with the emergency and permanent repairs of the facility. Preliminary damage assessments were conducted by Recovery office personnel in conjunction with County Public Works, and the damage has been estimated to be \$295,000 for both emergency and permanent work.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$200,000 to this emergency for these repairs.

C. Coconino County Campbell Avenue Flooding (73006)

Declaration: September 30, 2011

On September 13, 2011, a powerful seasonal monsoon rain passed over areas in Coconino County that were severely burned by the Schultz Fire. The heavy rains resulted in significant flooding and debris flow that caused significant damage to several major roads in the Timberline, Hutchison Acres and Wupatki Trails areas. The debris and heavy sediment flow also damaged several portions of the Lower Campbell Avenue, as well as other areas that were impacted during a summer 2010 declared emergency and are subject to repeated damage from floods off the Schultz Fire burn areas. The flooding has undermined protective measures (gabion baskets) that were in place prior to the storm on Lower Campbell Avenue, and required major construction to repair these to their pre-disaster condition.

The County, in accordance with A.A.C. R8-2-304, requested assistance from the State with the emergency and permanent repairs of the facility, as well as reimbursement of labor and equipment utilized in their emergency response. Preliminary damage assessments were conducted by Recovery office personnel in conjunction with County Public Works, and the damage has been estimated to be \$470,000 for both emergency and permanent work.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$200,000 to this emergency for these repairs.

D. Gladiator Fire (73007)

Declaration: May 26, 2012

A human-caused fire which originated from a structure fire on private property moved onto the Prescott National Forest east of Crown King in Yavapai County on May 13, 2012. The Gladiator Fire burned uncontrolled for over three weeks as federal and state fire suppression resources responded and worked to suppress the fire. Prior to its containment, evacuations were ordered for the residents of Crown King due to the extreme fire behavior and ongoing red flag conditions. Six structures were

destroyed and numerous homes in the Pine Flat subdivision were threatened, along with the Towers Mountain communication sites and other public infrastructure.

All costs associated with the suppression and fire resource responses to the event to date were supported by the Arizona State Department of Forestry. Additionally, Arizona State Forestry Division applied for a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) from FEMA but was denied.

The County, in accordance with A.A.C. R8-2-304, requested assistance from the State for reimbursement of labor and equipment utilized in their emergency response but not covered by AZ Dept. of Forestry. ADEM is in the process of assessing the County's costs, as well as the need for State funding and support.

The Governor's declaration appropriated \$10,000 to this emergency for these costs.

Declaration: October 8, 2010

Terminated: November 21, 2011

III. GUBERNATORIAL PROCLAMATIONS CONTINUING

A. **STATEWIDE DROUGHT EMERGENCY (99006)**

Declared: June 23, 1999

- The Governor proclaimed an emergency due to the lack of precipitation.

- On May 22, 2007, the Governor signed Executive Order 2007-10, Drought Declaration for The State of Arizona. The Order supplements the directives in the Statewide Drought Emergency and shall remain in effect until the Governor rescinds it.
- Loans that offset economic losses because of reduced revenues to farmers and ranchers caused by drought have been made available by USDA and Small Business Administration.
- No funding allocation from the Governor's Emergency Fund has been made.

**B. NORTHERN ARIZONA WINTER STORM EMERGENCY (25004)
(Presidential Declaration FEMA-DR-1581-AZ)**

Declared: December 29, 2004

Amended: December 30, 2004, January 4, 2005 and January 11, 2005

Presidential Declaration FEMA-1581-DR-AZ: February 17, 2005

- The President's declaration provided Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs for Coconino, Gila, Mohave, Navajo and Yavapai Counties and the Hopi and Navajo Nations.
- The Small Business Administration (SBA) declared an emergency for Mohave County.
- Maricopa County was not included in the Federal declaration as they did not meet the county threshold requirement in accordance with the federal regulation. Maricopa County is supported under the Governor's declaration.
- Five (5) applicants are in their final closeout processes. The remaining thirty-one (31) applicant files have been closed. We anticipate being able to close out this event with DHS/FEMA in FY13.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$2,758,414 with no anticipated additional future allocation needs.

**C. FEBRUARY 2005 WINTER STORMS & FLOODING EMERGENCY
(25005)**

(Presidential Declaration FEMA-DR-1586-AZ)

Declared: February 16, 2005

Amended: March 8, 2005

Presidential Declaration FEMA-1586-DR-AZ: April 14, 2005

- The President's declaration provided Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs for the counties of Gila, Graham, Greenlee, Mohave, Pinal and Yavapai as well as the Havasupai Tribe, the Hopi Tribe, the San Carlos Apache Tribe and the portion of the Navajo Tribal Nation within the State of Arizona.
- Maricopa County was not included in the Federal declaration as they did not meet the county threshold requirement in accordance with the

federal regulation. Maricopa County is supported under the Governor's declaration.

- Two projects are still active/outstanding for this event.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$4,212,689 with no anticipated additional future allocation needs.

**D. OPERATION GOOD NEIGHBOR (26003)
(Presidential Declaration FEMA-EM-3241-AZ)**

Declared: September 3, 2005

Presidential Declaration FEMA-3241-EM-AZ: September 12, 2005

- The Governor was requested by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to assist with the national state of emergency due to the catastrophic consequences of Hurricane Katrina.
- First evacuees arrived in Arizona on September 4, 2005.
- September 12, 2005, the President declared an Emergency Declaration for the support efforts provided by Arizona to include 100% federal reimbursement.
- Final payments have been disbursed and thirty-nine (39) applicant files are closed. Legal action was taken against citizens who falsely represented themselves as evacuees and subsequently received support from the Federal government. Restitution payments are being received as a direct result. This has impacted our ability to close this event this fiscal year.
- ADEM is in the final closeout process with DHS/FEMA for this event.

**E. SUMMER 2006 MONSOONS & FLOODING EMERGENCY (27001)
(Presidential Declaration FEMA-DR-1660-AZ)**

Declaration: August 8, 2006

Amended: September 13, 2006

Presidential Declaration FEMA-1660-DR-AZ: September 7, 2006

Amended: September 29, 2006 and November 9, 2006

- The President's declaration and subsequent amendments made Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs available for Gila, Graham, Greenlee, Navajo, Pinal and Pima Counties, the Gila River Indian Community within Pinal County, the tribal areas of the Hopi Tribe within Navajo County, the Navajo Nation within Apache, Coconino and Navajo Counties and the Tohono O'Odham Nation within Pima and Pinal Counties.
- There is still one open/active project for this event. Several applicants are still in the audit review process.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$1,926,217 with an anticipated future allocation need of \$1,182,781 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

**F. JANUARY 2010 WINTER STORM EMERGENCY (20102)
(Presidential Declaration FEMA-DR-3307-AZ AND FEMA-DR-1888-AZ)**

Declaration: January 21, 2010

Amended: February 11, 2010

Presidential Declarations: FEMA-3307-DR-AZ: January 24, 2010

FEMA-1888-DR-AZ: March 18, 2010

- The Governor declared an emergency for significant cumulative precipitation coupled with high winds and heavy snow in areas across Arizona from January 18 – 22, 2010. This storm system led to record levels of snowfall and significant flooding posing an extreme danger to public health and safety.
- On January 24, 2010 the Governor submitted a request to the President for an Emergency Declaration in support of life sustaining efforts to the citizens of the Hopi Tribe and Navajo Nations. This was a complex incident involving two tribes, three counties and a very large geographical area.
- President Obama declared an emergency on January 24, 2010 and authorized Federal relief for the affected area.
- The President's major disaster declaration made Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs available for Apache, Coconino, Gila, Greenlee, La Paz, Mohave, Navajo and Yavapai Counties and the Gila River Indian Community, Hopi Tribe, Navajo Nation, San Carlos Apache, Tohono O'odham Nation and White Mountain Apache Tribe.
- The Governor's requests for Snow Assistance as well as activation of FEMA's Individual Assistance Program were denied, as was the appeal.
- There were a total of 243 projects associated with this event. Nineteen are still open and active. The remaining projects are in various stages of final inspection, audit and closeout.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$3,860,000 with an anticipated future allocation need of \$185,000 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

**G. SCHULTZ FIRE POST-FIRE FLOODING EMERGENCY (11001)
(Presidential Declaration FEMA-DR-1940-AZ)**

Declaration: July 21, 2010

Presidential Declarations: FEMA-1940-DR-AZ: October 4, 2010

Amended: November 22, 2010

- On July 20, 2010 an early afternoon rainfall of about 1.6" to 2" within a 30 minute timeframe fell on the steep terrain and intense burn area of the Schultz Fire. This rain caused flash flooding of debris, ash, mud and rain impacting many downstream communities in the Flagstaff area.

- On September 16, 2010 the Governor submitted a request to the President for a Major Disaster Declaration for this Post-Fire Flooding event.
- On October 4, 2010, the President declared a major disaster for Coconino County, activating the Public Assistance Program and making available the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program to political subdivisions statewide. Both of these programs are to be administered by the Arizona Division of Emergency Management.
- On November 22, 2010, the President amended this declaration to include the Hopi Tribe. FEMA is providing the Hopi Tribe with support for the Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs. As a sovereign nation the Hopi Tribe is working directly with DHS/FEMA and will provide for their non-federal cost share.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$1,500,000. More than half of the projects for this event are still underway.

H. MONSOON 2010 FLOODING EMERGENCY (11003)

Declaration: August 4, 2010

- On July 19, 2010, through July 29, 2010, a series of potent monsoon thunderstorms causing high winds and flash floods damaged many locations in southeastern Arizona. The heavy rains resulted in unusually strong flooding events and caused extreme peril to public health and safety in two primary areas: Wards Canyon in Greenlee County and the Nogales Wash in Santa Cruz County.
- These water flows caused extensive damages to public infrastructure and threatened resources that provide essential life services to Greenlee and Santa Cruz residents, primarily roads and sewer lines.
- Total allocations from the Governor's Emergency Fund to date are \$315,000 with an anticipated future allocation need of \$400,000 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

I. DECEMBER 2010 FLOODING (73001)

Declaration: January 27, 2011

- Between December 18, 2010 and December 22, 2010, a series of heavy rainstorms caused flash floods that damaged several areas in northwestern Arizona. The heavy rains resulted in significant flooding causing extreme peril to public health and safety to residents of the Beaver Dam/Littlefield area and Town of Colorado City in Mohave County.
- An abnormally high flow of water was measured in a tributary of the Virgin River in Beaver Dam/Littlefield, and created considerable damage to both public and private properties, including homes. Public

infrastructure damages included impacts to a sewage system in Virgin River and road damages in Colorado City.

- The Governor's declaration appropriated \$100,000 to this emergency. There is an anticipated future allocation need of \$70,000 for current unfunded outstanding obligations.

J. WALLOW FIRE (73002)

Declaration: June 6, 2011

- The Wallow Fire began in the Apache-Sitgreaves National Forest in Greenlee County on May 29, 2011. On June 6, 2011 the Governor declared an emergency for Apache and Greenlee Counties.
- Arizona State Forestry Division received a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) from FEMA on June 2, 2011. This grant will support the reimbursement of costs associated with suppression of the fire being directed by the Incident Management Team and emergency protective measures and response efforts conducted by agencies at the direction of Apache County. Funding allocated under this disaster declaration is to support costs not covered by the FMAG and/or for recovery support following suppression of the fire.
- On July 6, 2011 the Governor requested assistance from the Small Business Administration (SBA) in the form of an Economic Injury Disaster Loan Declaration for Apache County.
- The Governor's declaration appropriated \$200,000 to this emergency. Additional funds will not be needed. This event is in the closeout process.

K. Horseshoe 2 & Monument Fires (73003)

Declaration: June 17, 2011

- These two separate wildfires burned portions of Cochise County: the Horseshoe Two Fire broke out in the Chiricahua Mountains on May 8, 2011; the Monument Fire began in the Coronado National Memorial/Coronado National Forest on June 12, 2011. On June 17, 2011 the Governor declared an emergency for Cochise County.
- Arizona State Forestry Division received a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) from FEMA for the Horseshoe 2 fire on May 9, 2011 and for the Monument Fire on June 12, 2011. These grants will support the reimbursement of costs associated with suppression of the fire being directed by the Incident Management Team and emergency protective measures and response efforts conducted by agencies at the direction of Cochise County. Funding allocated under this disaster declaration is to support costs not covered by the FMAGs and/or for recovery support following suppression of the fires.
- On July 6, 2011 the Governor requested assistance from the Small Business Administration (SBA) in the form of a Physical Disaster and

Economic Injury Disaster Declaration for Cochise County for impacts related to the Monument Fire.

- The Governor's declaration appropriated \$100,000 to this emergency. Additional funds will not be needed. This event is in the closeout process.

V. CONTINGENCIES

A. STATEWIDE SEARCH AND RESCUE CONTINGENCY (70100)

There were 653 search and rescue mission identifiers issued to County Sheriffs for field operations during FY2012. Costs reimbursed to County Sheriffs and State support agencies as well as audit costs incurred for this contingency totaled \$203,405.11. Funding allocations made for the Search and Rescue Contingency within fiscal year 2012 totaled \$315,000.

B. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS CONTINGENCY (80100)

There were no hazardous materials incident responses supported by the Governor's HAZMAT Contingency Fund during the period July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2012. Costs incurred for this contingency were audit costs for previous fiscal years in the amount of \$94.48. There were no funding allocations made for the Hazardous Materials Contingency within fiscal year 2012.
